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# **Chairperson Update**

It is with great pride that I present this year's Chairperson's Report, reflecting a period of transformation, resilience and renewed strategic focus for Narang Bir-rong Aboriginal Corporation.

Guided by our previous strategic plan, we have made significant strides in strengthening our services, expanding our reach and deepening our impact. The momentum we've built has outpaced our expectations, and we are now actively developing a new strategic plan to guide our next chapter; one that reflects the evolving needs of our communities, the ambition of our organisation and our commitment to our mission.

Guided by our core values of Connections, Empowerment, Consistency, Belonging and Confidentiality, Narang Bir-rong is a values-driven, for purpose organisation committed to ensuring these principles are reflected in everything we do.

In line with this philosophy – Narang Bir-rong's AGM is a safe and welcoming space – open and



inclusive of our members, community representatives and valued employees.

Our AGM is key tenant of our governance framework. Board compliance and governance provide the foundations for Narang Bir-rong to maintain its operations and its ongoing positive impact across our communities. Our efforts to improve Board Governance is driven by this purpose.

A key milestone this year has been the successful recruitment of four new directors to our Board.

This process was undertaken with great care and purposeful intention, and we are delighted to welcome individuals whose diverse skills, lived experience and strategic insight which will enrich our governance and strengthen our leadership. Their appointment marks a new era of Board renewal and positions us well for the future. Director recruitment will remain a focus of the Board to ensure that we have the right mix of community representation and skill, experience and competencies to lead Narang Bir-rong sustainably into the future.

In response to the increasing complexity of our operating environment, the Board has engaged Gabriel Edwards as Strategic Advisor. Gabriel brings deep expertise in governance, organisational culture and strategic planning, and has been instrumental in supporting both the Board and management team through a difficult period of internal transition and sector changes.

This year has not been without its challenges. We have experienced a period of intense and sustained, external commentary and scrutiny. Social and mainstream media attention on allegations has had a deep impact on all levels of the organisation.

This has resulted in some unexpected temporary changes within our leadership team, and

while transitions of this nature can be difficult, they have been managed with care, discretion and a focus on continuity. The Board remains committed to upholding the integrity of our organisation and supporting our people through times of challenge and change.

Despite these shifts, our commitment to service excellence has remained steadfast and strong. We were pleased to have our accreditation from the Office of the Children's Guardian renewed for another five years, reaffirming our dedication to child safety and best practice standards.

At the heart of our work is a deep and enduring commitment to advocating for Aboriginal children and young people. We remain guided by culture, community and the strength of our identity; standing proud as Aboriginal people, determined to create safe, empowering pathways for the next generation.

Looking ahead, our new strategic plan will reflect our ambition to grow sustainably, strengthen partnerships and continue delivering culturally safe, high-quality services. On behalf of the Board, I extend my deepest gratitude to our staff, carers, community partners and supporters.

Your trust, resilience and commitment are the foundation of our success.

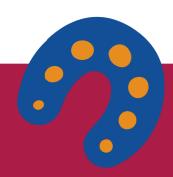
#### **Peter Hawkins**

# Program Update

2025 has been a landmark year for Narang Bir-rong's Cultural Connections Program, with a wide range of initiatives and events that have strengthened cultural engagement for our children and communities. A highlight has been our After-School Cultural Hub, providing a safe and vibrant space for children to learn, connect, and celebrate their heritage. Committed to continuous improvement, we have enhanced the Program to ensure long-term success and meaningful community impact.

This year, we introduced our redesigned Cultural Care Plan booklet, equipping children with detailed information about their families, communities, and culture, and supporting their sense of identity and belonging. Children and families have also benefited from participation in cultural groups and events, camps on country, and opportunities to explore family history and genealogy.







A new position was also introduced this year, the Family History Research Worker who collaborates with our Cultural Connections Workers on a daily basis in the development of the Cultural Care Plans. Offering more in-depth family connections and lineage to their mob. Through this work, the Family History Research Worker has not only connected Narang Bir-rong kids in the program who otherwise had no idea they were related, have also connected them to ancestors that they can be proud of. Some of these being war veteran's, Warriors and "Kings" and "Queens" of tribes and even Aboriginal activists who fought hard for Aboriginal rights.

The Deadly Wagana's dance group was another outstanding achievement for Narang Bir-rong where the dance group was opened to the broader community and proudly performed at Penrith NAIDOC 2025, sharing culture through music and dance.

Overall, 2025 has been a year of growth, connection, and celebration, reinforcing our commitment to maintaining and strengthening children's ties to culture while creating a culturally safe and inclusive environment for all.

# Family Preservation & TEI

### Programs Update

In 2025, our Family Preservation and Targeted Early Intervention teams continued to provide culturally safe support, including case management, structured home visiting, referrals, and collaboration with community stakeholders. Through this support, families are empowered to keep their children safe, encourage positive development, and access the resources and networks they need to thrive.

This year has been a significant success in keeping children safe and strengthening families. Over 150 children were supported to remain safely at home, and 54 families were able to reach a point where they were assessed as no longer at risk by DCJ. By equipping families with practical tools and culturally responsive guidance, we continue to help children grow up in safe environments while supporting parents to build resilience and manage long-term family wellbeing.

# **Restoration** Program Update

Our Restoration team is dedicated to creating safe, stable, and nurturing pathways for children to reunite with their families. We address the enduring impacts of intergenerational trauma and systemic barriers, empowering families to heal and build resilience. We are steadfast in our commitment to reducing the impact of child removal on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, focusing on their safe restoration to parents. By centering cultural values and holistic support, we help families break cycles of adversity.

In 2025, we continued to support families in strengthening bonds and creating stable environments for children. Our team worked closely with parents through tailored case plans, family action plans, and goal-setting to meet court-ordered commitments in meaningful ways, while addressing the underlying trauma and challenges unique to each family. We also received restoration orders for four children and successfully closed three family cases, supporting a total of eight children in their restoration journeys.





# Sisters Restored Home Good News Story

In 2025, after 6 long years in long term care, sisters Kaylee and Brianna were restored to the care of their parents.

During these years, the girls parent's were able to address historic concerns raised by DCJ and the Children's Court by way of maintain sobriety, improving their overall mental health, demonstrating learnings from parenting courses and by obtain suitable, safe and stable housing for the children.

At the beginning of 2024, the girls' brother Liam returned home as he was placed in general foster care, without family connection. The children's parents were motivated to have their family whole again so following the successful restoration of Liam, and the parent's continued positive change the Children's Court granted restoration of Kaylee and Brianna after an expedited court process of three months. Both Kaylee and Brianna were ecstatic to hear they would be returning to the care of their parents and brother after 6 years, and had a swift and positive transition from their kinship placement to their new home.

# Out of Home Care Program Update

The Out of Home Care program at Narang Bir-rong continues to provide a stable, supportive, and secure foundation for the children, carers, and families we work with. Recognising the ongoing challenges faced by children in care, we remain committed to addressing the lasting impacts of transgenerational trauma and supporting our jarjums through these experiences. Our focus is on healing the wounds of removal while maintaining and strengthening cultural connections, which are essential to the wellbeing of our children.

In 2025, we prioritised placement stability, cultural connection, and individual wellbeing, ensuring each child's care plan kept them at the centre of our work. Early in the year, we restructured our services, separating the Leaving Care, Specialist Aftercare, and Out of Home Care programs. This means the home visit figures below now reflect only the Out of Home Care team's work.

This year, the team achieved a 92% placement stability rate, reflecting our continued dedication to providing safe, high-quality, and culturally responsive care for jarjums, carers, and families.

Young people transitioned to the Leaving Care Program



2025 was a successful year for our Leaving Care program, which continues to support young people aged 15 and above in preparing for a smooth and confident transition from care. Participants, referred either through agencies or via self-referral, engaged in tailored Life Ready plans to develop practical skills in budgeting, cooking, job seeking, self-care, and overall wellbeing. These plans are designed not only to build independence but also to give young people the confidence to make positive choices and navigate the challenges of adulthood.

Our young people also participated in cultural programs, mentoring opportunities, and a cultural camp we hosted at Yarramundi, helping them strengthen their connections to culture and grow into resilient adults. In 2025, 93% are in stable housing, 90% have reconnected with family, and 79% are engaged in education or employment, ensuring they have a strong support system as they transition to adulthood and pursue self-determined futures.

### Program Update

Our After Care program supports young people aged 18–25, through agency or self-referrals, offering practical assistance with housing, health, education, employment, and life skills. The program focuses on helping young people maintain independence while staying connected to culture, community, and supportive networks.

In 2025, our team continued to provide personalised guidance tailored to each young person's goals, from securing stable housing and employment to improving wellbeing and life skills. Young people were encouraged to engage with community, develop self-confidence, and strengthen meaningful relationships.

Through consistent support and connection, the After Care program helps participants navigate adult life successfully, make informed decisions, and build a foundation for long-term stability and personal growth.







# Carer Recruitment Program Update

In 2025, our career recruitment strategy continued to grow through proactive outreach, strong community engagement, and ongoing support for prospective carers. By harnessing social media, participating in local events, and fostering meaningful partnerships, we expanded awareness and visibility around the ongoing need for foster carers.

We also refined our assessment process and delivered comprehensive, culturally responsive training to ensure every carer felt confident and supported from the start. This approach not only strengthened recruitment outcomes but also reaffirmed our commitment to creating safe, nurturing homes for children and young people in care.
